

TUITION REDUCTION INFORMATION

Stop & Shop Gift Card Program

The following describes our Stop & Shop Gift Card Program...a valuable way for you to **reduce your tuition**.

*****THIS IS NOT A FUNDRAISER...EVERY DOLLAR EARNED GOES DIRECTLY TOWARDS YOUR TUITION*****

How it works:

Families purchase Stop & Shop gift cards through the school. These cards are in \$10, \$20, \$50 and \$100 increments. These cards can be used anytime at any Stop & Shop store, as well as at their gas stations. Cards can be used by anyone since there are no names on the cards. They can also be used to purchase gas. It's the same as using cash, but you are receiving money back toward your tuition.

Stop & Shop offers us a 5% discount on bulk gift cards purchases made through the school. Twice yearly (in January & June) the 5% that each family earns on their purchases will be credited towards tuition. You will receive a notice informing you of the total credit and how your tuition payments will be adjusted.

Here are two examples for you to follow:

1. On THURSDAY, Mrs. Smith sends in her order form and check for the amount of gift cards she wishes to purchase for the upcoming week. She orders \$100.00 worth of gift cards and makes her check out to Blessed Sacrament PTG and sends it in with her child to school. The following THURSDAY, Mrs. Smith receives her gift cards and also sends in another order form and check for the next week.

Mrs. Smith has earned 5% or \$5.00 towards her child's tuition. If she does this every week for 10 weeks, she will earn \$50.00 off her tuition.

2. Mr. Jones collects \$300.00 from friends and family to purchase gift cards for them. On THURSDAY, he sends in his order form and ONE check for the total amount. The following THURSDAY, Mr. Jones receives \$300.00 in gift cards to distribute to his friends and family and also sends in another order form and ONE check for the next week.

Mr. Jones has earned 5% or \$15.00 towards his child's tuition. If he does this every week for 10 weeks, he will earn \$150.00 off his tuition.
